







I. ATHENS: A CITY OF EXTREMES

city was full of idols.






Gaius Petronius, he sarcastically remarks that in Athens it was easier to find a god than a man.




Pausanias, states that Athens had more images than, all Greece put together.





going to proclaim to you.



Acts 17:28a 'For in him we live and move and have



Acts 17:31 For he has set a day when he will judge the world with justice by the man he has appointed. He has given proof of this to everyone by raising him from the




